# How to Tame a Slope

A deft garden designer shows her skills, and her colors, in her own backyard.

**Where other people** see problems, Barbara Katz sees possibilities. It's a mark of an experienced garden designer: She's not fearless, but she is confident.

Barbara is the owner of London Landscapes, near Washington, D.C. Her college degree is in theater, which she followed up with courses in garden design in England. She worked in London for a year and a half before opening her business in Bethesda, Maryland. For more than 30 years, she has been designing and installing gardens of every style and size—all of them full of color and life.

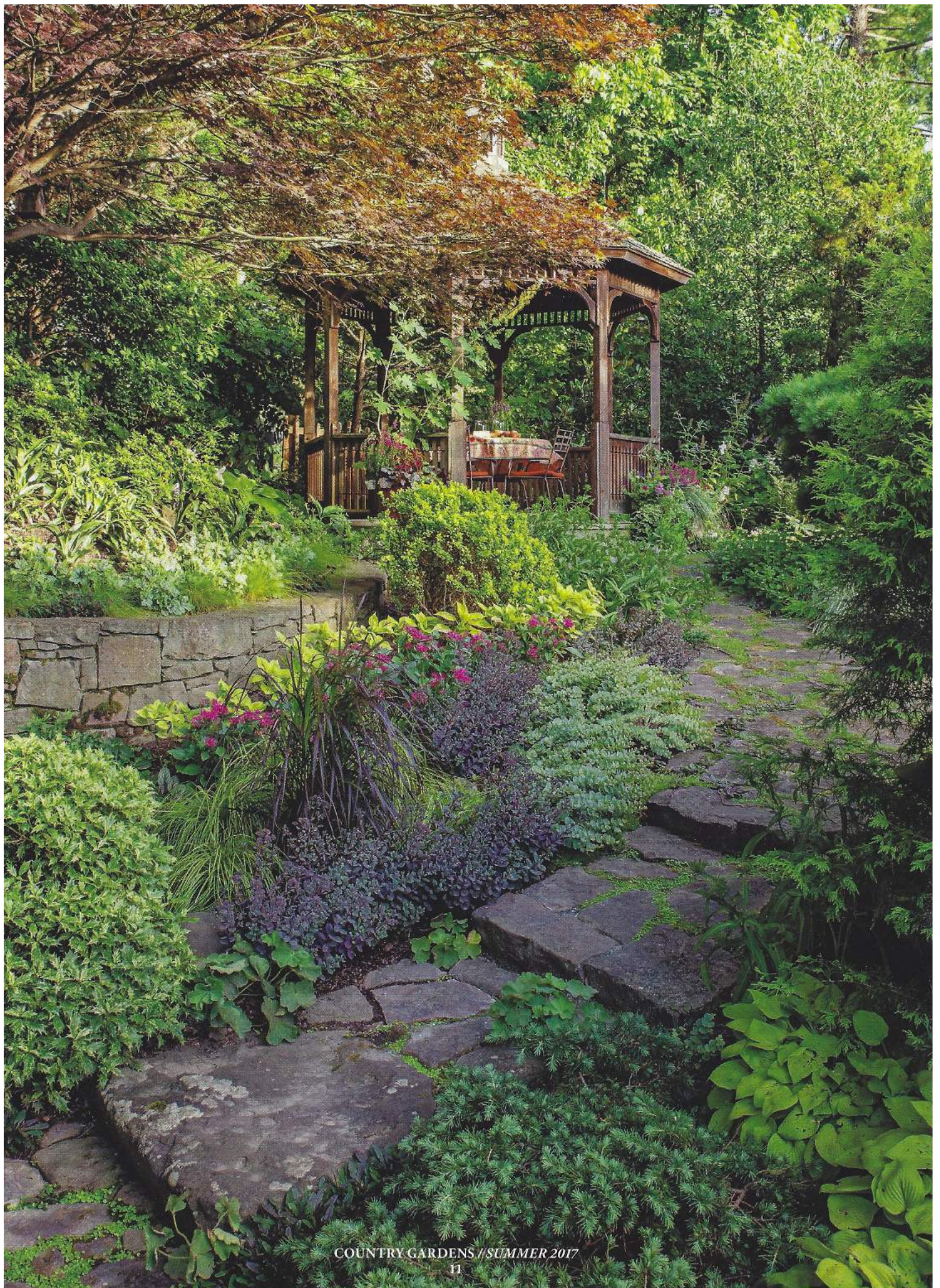
Her own backyard presented a formidable challenge. The lot slopes up from the back of the house to the property line, rising about 12 feet from the back door to a nearly 200-year-old white oak at the top. A steep site may seem intimidating, but "it's really a wonderful opportunity," Barbara says. A sloping garden is a little like a theater viewed from the stage itself, she says. "Plants reveal themselves to you in ways they can't on flat terrain."

To turn the slope into a garden, Barbara first carved a generous patio just outside the sliding-glass doors from the kitchen and living area across the back of the house. To keep rainwater from running down the slope and onto the patio, French drains channel the runoff to flat areas where it can percolate into the soil. The flagstone patio, laid on a bed of stone dust, is highly permeable itself.

Stone retaining walls define a couple of terraces on the slope, and wide steps lead visitors up to experience the exuberant planting. "It's a garden that draws you into all its nooks and crannies," Barbara says. "Every square foot is valuable, and it's great to interact with it all."

To one side of the stairs, water splashes down the slope into a series of shallow pools connected by graceful falls. Barbara started laying out the watercourse with a rough sketch, then marked her ideas on the ground with landscaping flags and spray paint.







The water animates the garden. The sound of moving water, the way the light sparkles in the quiet pools, and the birds the water attracts all give the garden a mood that the space alone—without water—could never achieve, she says.

Plants in great abundance fill out the design. “I’m a crazy, crazy plant nut,” Barbara says. “I’m like a magpie. I’m attracted to stuff.” But chaos is not her style. She manages colors carefully to keep the peace in her flowerbeds. On one side of the garden, Barbara chose plants with flowers, foliage, stems, or berries all in tones of orange, white, and purple. She permits herself no yellow in this area. On the other side, yellow, pink, blue, and maroon take over. The disciplined division of the palette is a crucial restraint in these rich plantings, but the effect is entirely natural.

Annual flowers are an essential part of the plan: They’re too hardworking to overlook, Barbara says. She makes room for annuals in the beds themselves and in flowerpots,

in which she experiments with color combinations to complement the dominant palettes in the flowerbeds. Annuals are “glorious, impermanent, and cool,” she says. If you don’t make use of them, “it’s a lost opportunity.”

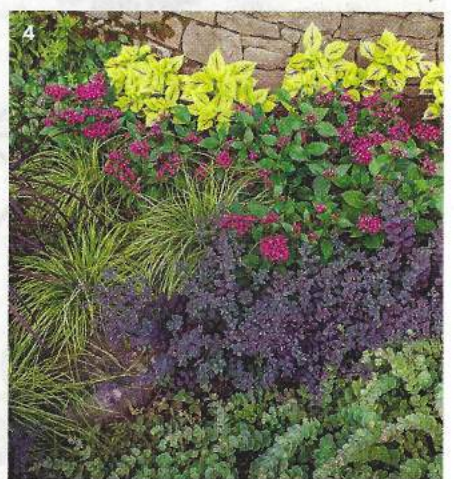
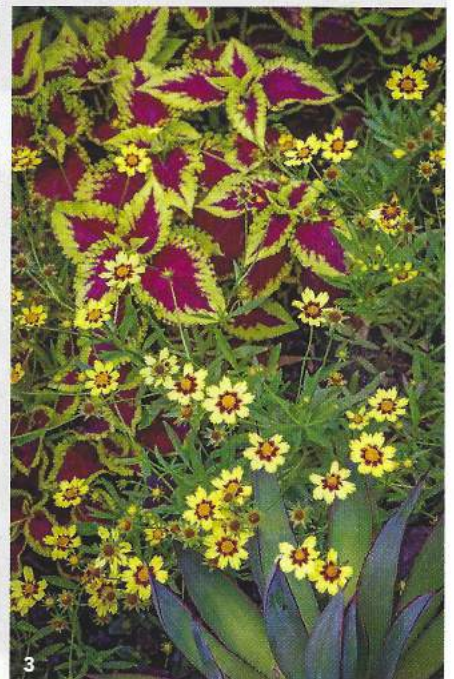
If you’re looking for ideas for a low-maintenance garden, busy garden designers like Barbara are the people to ask; they have little time to maintain their own gardens. Barbara needs to step into her beds to prune here and there and do a little weeding, but she depends on a choice selection of “incredibly well-behaved” shrubs and perennials. She may make an occasional exception, but plants that are susceptible to diseases or that need deadheading or staking are not on her list. “The old English style, where everything is staked and perfect—nobody has time for that,” she says. In her own backyard, especially, she wants to be able to sit back and enjoy the show. ☐
